- Replaced PSEO and other dual enrollment programs

Qualifications that work!

- Students with a 3.5 GPA or higher
- English ACT of 18 or higher (SAT 450)
- ♦ CCP Calculus: Math ACT of 25 or higher (SAT 590)
- ♦ CCP Statistics: Math ACT of 22 or higher (SAT 540)
- ♦ CCP Biology: Math ACT of 20 or higher (SAT 520)
- Emotionally mature, good time manager, dedication and discipline to academics



What type of course?

- We suggest courses that align to the college and career goals of the student and that complement the student's academic program at NDCL
- May NOT be remedial courses, religious in nature, PE, courses with high fees, pass/fail
- May be online, at the college campus or here at NDCL
- 13 University of Mt. Union classes taught <u>at NDCL</u>




Credits

- ♦ College courses are weighted the same as AP and Honors within subject area
- Grades and credits earned in college are applied to high school requirements
- 3-5 college semester hours = 1 high school credit
- 2 college semester hours = 0.66high school credit
- ♦ 1 college semester hours = 0.33 high school credit

Pathways

- Students may earn up to 30 college credit hours per academic year.
- Students may earn no more than 120 college credits while in the program.
- Pathways have been designed to show examples of what type of classes a student might choose.

Differences between high school and college

	High School	College
Homework	Avg 1-3 hours per day	Standard rule 2 hours for every hour of class
Knowledge Acquisition	Information provided mostly in-class	Requires more independent thinking and out of class reading/research
Tests	Typically, at the end of units or chapters	Generally, fewer and cover more material

Benefits to consider

- Classes are at a higher level of difficulty and rigor
- Completion of NDCL graduation requirements and college credits simultaneously
- ◆ Earn college credit at NO cost to student or family (pending state funding allocations)
- Students take responsibility for their own learning
- Expansion of course offerings
- ♦ Credits earned at an Ohio public college through CCP are guaranteed to transfer to any other Ohio public college





Risks to consider

- May reduce opportunities for extracurricular participation if taken outside of the school day
- ♦ A failed or dropped CCP class will be included on the high school and college transcript and calculated into the cumulative GPA
- Different calendar dates between college and high school
- Private and out-of-state colleges may not accept college credits earned through CCP
- Funding for CCP classes is not guaranteed
- Increased rigor and responsibility

College-level Expectations

- ♦ Students and parents are required to complete a permission slip to participate in the College Credit Plus Program.
 - "The subject matter of a course enrolled in under the college credit plus program may include mature subject matter or materials, including those of a graphic, explicit, violent, or sexual nature, that will not be modified based upon college credit plus enrollee participation regardless of where course instruction occurs."
- Students are required to complete a student questionnaire.
 - ◆ Do you possess the necessary social and emotional maturity to participate in the College Credit Plus program?
 - Are you ready to accept the responsibility and independence that a college classroom demands?

Timeline (now – April 1)

- Student registers to take college admittance test:
 - ACT Test date: April 5, Register by February 28
 - SAT Test date: March 8, Register by February 21
 - Juniors: State-sponsored ACT on March 11
 - Spanish placement test: TBD
- Student applies to the college of interest. College-ready test scores are needed for final acceptance.
 - Deadline to apply to UMU: March 15, 2025 (first time students only)
- Once funding is approved, the student finalizes which college class(es) he/she is interested in taking and registers.
- Student meets with high school counselor to finalize a schedule that unites the NDCL schedule and college schedule. (if taking classes off-campus)


Timeline (now – April 1)



- ▲ A *parent* creates an OH | ID account through the ODE website (Feb 1 Apr 1).
- ♦ Once the OH | ID account is established, the request for funding application can be started. However, to finalize the application, a college acceptance letter must be uploaded, (Feb 1 Apr 1 at 5 PM EST).

Common Funding Application Errors

Step 12: Finish information sections • Type in or select any information that is currently blank. If there is a red * next to a field, then it is a required field. Note: Only non-chartered/non-tax supported schools ("08") must type in "136846" for the relevant Nonpublic School IRN as shown in Figure 11. Do not search for a school name if your student attends a Chartered, Nonpublic school, please use the school's designated IRN. Treate New Student Application




